






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
100 books to read before you leave Primary School: a mixture of established and modern classics to entertain, inspire, escape to new worlds, walk in the shoes of others and make you think...

1.		Journey to Jo'Burg by Beverley Naidoo This is a story of love, commitment and the strength of the human spirit, set against the background of South Africa's apartheid. Frightened that their baby sister will die of starvation, Naledi and Tiro make a brave journey to find their Mma who works as a maid for a wealthy family in the city of Johannesburg.
2.		The Goldfish Boy by Lisa Thompson 12-year-old Matthew struggles with OCD and watches the world go by from inside his bedroom in Chestnut Close. However, when he becomes the last witness to see a neighbour's toddler, he must turn detective to solve the mystery – despite his personal challenges.
3.		The Last Bear by Hannah Gold There are no bears left on Bear Island – or so April's father tells her, as he sets off for his Arctic research post. But one summer night, April meets one – endangered, starving, lonely and a long way from home. Can she save him before it's too late?
4.		Matilda by Roald Dahl Matilda's parents have called her some terrible things, but the truth is that she's the genius and they are the stupid ones! Underestimating Matilda proves to be a big mistake as they and her spiteful and thuggish headmistress, Miss Trunchbull, soon find out when Matilda discovers she has a very special power.
5.		The Gruffalo by Julia Donaldson “A mouse took a stroll through the deep, dark wood. A fox saw the mouse and the mouse looked good!” Walk further into the deep, dark wood and discover what happened when the quick-thinking mouse comes face-to-face with an owl, a snake and a hungry Gruffalo!

<p>6.</p> 	<p>The Lion, The Witch and The Wardrobe by C. S. Lewis</p> <p>The Chronicles of Narnia series have enchanted readers for over 70 years... Join Lucy, Peter, Edmund and Susan as they climb through the wardrobe into the magical land of Narnia – a world of eternal winter, witches, talking animals, battles and bravery.</p>
<p>7.</p> 	<p>The Very Hungry Caterpillar by Eric Carle</p> <p>A much-loved classic, this caterpillar's tale has been bringing joy to millions of readers for decades as they have munched their way through a whole feast of treats. Holes in the pages invite little fingers to nibble their way through the story!</p>
<p>8.</p> 	<p>Clockwork by Phillip Pullman</p> <p>A tormented apprentice clockmaker, a deadly mechanical knight in armour and the sinister Dr Kalmenius... Wind up these characters, fit them into a story on a cold winter's evening and the plot appears to develop in a macabre and unstoppable away – almost like clockwork!</p>
<p>9.</p> 	<p>Dogger by Shirley Hughes</p> <p>When Dave loses his favourite toy, Dogger, he is desolate. Bedtimes are so hard without him. Dogger turns up in an unexpected place, but Dave is going to need his quick-thinking sister to help work out how to get him back in his arms!</p>
<p>10.</p> 	<p>Where The Wild Things Are by Maurice Sendak</p> <p>Max puts on his wolf suit and causes mischief; his mum sends him to his bedroom without supper. A forest begins to grow, and an ocean sails him to 'where the wild things are'. After a rumpus with monsters, when he declares himself King, Max realises he wants to sail back home to where people love him the most.</p>
<p>11.</p> 	<p>When Life Gives You Mangoes by Kereen Getten</p> <p>With rich descriptions of Caribbean islands and life in Jamaica, this story beautifully explores childhood friendships and family secrets. It takes a new girl arriving on the island to awaken Clara's memory of what actually happened last summer...</p>
<p>12.</p> 	<p>Black Beauty by Anna Sewell</p> <p>Black Beauty is born in a beautiful meadow and cared for by gentle humans. But life takes him far from home: from the stable of a gentleman to gruelling work as a cab horse in the city. Where will Black Beauty's journey lead him next and is there any human he can truly trust?</p>

<p>13.</p> 	<p>The Iron Man by Ted Hughes</p> <p>Mankind must put a stop to the dreadful destruction by the Iron Man and set a trap for him, but he cannot be kept down! Then, when a terrible monster from outer space threatens to destroy the planet, it is the Iron Man who finds a way to save the world.</p>
<p>14.</p> 	<p>Flat Stanley by Jeff Brown</p> <p>Stanley Lambchop is an ordinary boy with an extraordinary problem – one night, a giant pinboard fell on him and left him completely flat! After enjoying the benefits and fun of his new predicament, Stanley wonders how he'll ever fill out again.</p>
<p>15.</p> 	<p>Winnie The Pooh by A. A. Milne</p> <p>Winnie the Pooh may be a bear of very little brain, but thanks to his friends Piglet, Eeyore, Tigger and, of course, Christopher Robin, he's never far from an adventure. Pooh gets into a tight place, nearly catches a Woozle and heads off on an 'expotition' to the North Pole with the other animals!</p>
<p>16.</p> 	<p>Funny Bones by Janet and Allan Ahlberg</p> <p>Join the funny antics of a big skeleton, little skeleton and dog skeleton. They venture out from a dark, dark cellar in the hope of finding someone to scare. However, nothing goes to plan as everyone is asleep! Who will they be able to scare in the end?!</p>
<p>17.</p> 	<p>The Hobbit by J.R.R. Tolkien</p> <p>First published in 1937, this is a timeless classic. It tells the story of Bilbo, a peace-loving hobbit, who embarks on a strange and magical adventure. The wizard, Gandalf and a band of dwarves arrive unexpectedly and enlist his services on a dangerous expedition. Bilbo's life will never be the same again!</p>
<p>18.</p> 	<p>Owl Babies by Martin Waddell</p> <p>Three baby owls wake up one night, in a hole in their tree, to find that their mother has gone. They sit and wait, growing anxious, wondering when she will return. The joy of this book is the feeling we get when we are reunited with our loved ones.</p>
<p>19.</p> 	<p>Green Eggs and Ham by Dr Seuss</p> <p>Would you eat a plate of green eggs and ham? Sam-I-Am needs to use all his powers of persuasion to get a grumpy grouch to have a taste. This book teaches us that we cannot know what we like until we've tried it!</p>

<p>20.</p> 	<p>War Horse by Michael Morpurgo</p> <p>In the deadly chaos of the First World War, one horse witnesses the reality of battle from both sides of the trenches. Joey tells a powerful story of the truest friendships surviving in terrible times. He has seen the best and worst of humanity; this is his inspiring story.</p>
<p>21.</p> 	<p>The 100 Mile-per-hour Dog by Jeremy Strong</p> <p>Streaker is no ordinary dog. She is a rocket on four legs with a woof attached, and Trevor has got until the end of the holidays to train her! If he fails, he will lose his bet with horrible Charlie Smugg and something very yucky with frogspawn will happen!</p>
<p>22.</p> 	<p>The Tiger Who Came to Tea by Judith Kerr</p> <p>The doorbell rings just as Sophie and her mummy are sitting down to tea. Who could it possibly be? The last thing they expected was to find a big, furry tiger on the doorstep who is feeling hungry!</p>
<p>23.</p> 	<p>Treasure Island by Robert Louis Stevenson</p> <p>A classic adventure of buccaneers and buried gold. Its influence is enormous on popular perceptions of pirates, treasure maps marked with an 'X', schooners, Black Spot & one-legged seamen with parrots on their shoulders! Yo-ho-ho and a bottle of rum!</p>
<p>24.</p> 	<p>Artemis Fowl by Eoin Colfer</p> <p>Artemis Fowl is the most ingenious 12-year-old criminal mastermind in history. His bold and daring plan is to hold a leprechaun to ransom – but he gets more than he bargained for when he kidnaps Holly Short, the captain of a 'LepRecon' Police Unit that will stop at nothing to get their heroine back!</p>
<p>25.</p> 	<p>Hairy Maclary from Donaldson's Dairy by Lynley Dodd</p> <p>Hairy Maclary sets off for a walk in town. He is soon joined by many of his dog friends... until they come face-to-face with the legendary Scarface Claw, the toughest tom in town! A cumulative, rhyming text matches terrific pictures to tell the story of the chase!</p>
<p>26.</p> 	<p>The Proudest Blue by Ibtihaj Muhammad</p> <p>It's Faizah's first day at school and her sister's first day of Hijab, her head-covering made of a beautiful blue fabric. Not everyone understands the beauty and significance of hijab at first, but these siblings show the importance of listening to your feelings, strong bonds and being proud of who you are.</p>

<p>27.</p> 	<p>Diary of a Wimpy Kid by Jeff Kinney</p> <p>Greg Heffley is thrust into a new year & school where undersize weaklings share corridors with kids who are taller, meaner and already shaving! Recorded in his diary with comic pictures, Greg and sidekick Rowley's friendship develops with hilarious results!</p>
<p>28.</p> 	<p>Pippi Longstocking by Astrid Lindgren</p> <p>Pippi lives in Villa Villekulla with a horse, monkey and a suitcase of gold coins. The grown-ups in her village try to get Pippi to behave in ways that they feel a little girl should behave, but Pippi has other ideas for a fun, free-spirited childhood!</p>
<p>29.</p> 	<p>I Am David by Anne Holm</p> <p>David escapes from the concentration camp where he has spent his entire life and flees across Europe. He is utterly alone and unsure who to trust. We join in his remarkable story, discovering a world he is new to whilst constantly watching out for whether he is being followed. Will he be caught & returned to the camp?</p>
<p>30.</p> 	<p>The Highwayman by Alfred Noyes</p> <p>In this thrilling poem, charged with drama and tension, we ride with the Highwayman and recoil from the terrible fate that befalls him and his sweetheart, Bess, the landlord's daughter.</p>
<p>31.</p> 	<p>Paddington by Michael Bond</p> <p>The classic story of the bear from darkest Peru who arrived at Paddington Station with nothing but a suitcase, a half-empty jar of marmalade and a label that read 'Please look after this bear'. Mr and Mrs Brown discovered him, named him Paddington and welcomed him to their home where he has lived ever since.</p>
<p>32.</p> 	<p>Amazing Grace by Mary Hoffman and Caroline Binch</p> <p>Grace loves to act out stories. Sometimes she plays the leading part, sometimes she is 'a cast of thousands'. When her school decides to perform Peter Pan, Grace is longing to play Peter, but her class tells her that Peter was a boy... and besides, he wasn't black. But Grace's Ma and Nana tell her that she can be anything she wants if she puts her mind to it...</p>

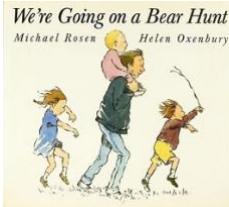

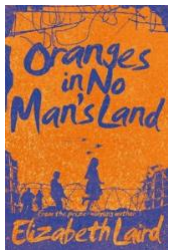

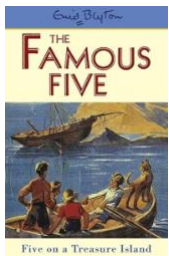
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Oranges in No Man's Land by Elizabeth Laird

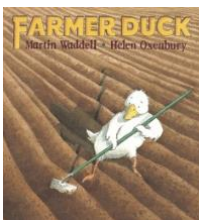
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Five on a Treasure Island by Enid Blyton

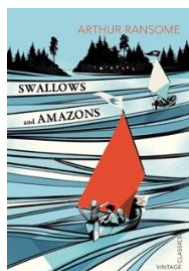
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Farmer Duck by Martin Waddell







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













Swallows and Amazons by Arthur Rackham

Varjak must now use ‘The Way’ to survive the danger of the city, cat gangs and mysterious vanishings. This is a tale of friendship, loyalty and difference.</p>
<p>41.</p> 	<p>My name is Sunshine Simpson by G. M. Linton</p> <p>Grandad is always saying to go out and find adventure, but Sunshine Simpson feels that everything goes wrong, she has bad luck... and Grandad is aging by the day. Sunshine needs to find her voice, but can she break through the clouds to stand tall, stand proud and show the world that she can shine?</p>
<p>42.</p> 	<p>The Wolves in the Walls by Neil Gaiman</p> <p>Lucy’s parents ignore her warnings that she can hear wolves in the walls. What will happen if they escape? Is it too late to take control? Prepare for a sinister, scary, atmospheric but funny graphic novel showing the power of being fearless!</p>
<p>43.</p> 	<p>Harry Potter & the Philosopher’s Stone by J.K. Rowling</p> <p>Harry Potter hasn’t even heard of Hogwarts when letters start arriving at 4 Privet Drive. They are swiftly confiscated by his controlling Aunt and Uncle. However, on Harry’s 11th Birthday, a beetle-eyed giant. Rubeus Hagrid bursts in with astonishing news: Harry is a wizard, and he is about to start an incredible adventure at Hogwarts School of Witchcraft and Wizardry!</p>
<p>44.</p> 	<p>Journey to the River Sea by Eva Ibbotson</p> <p>It is 1910 and orphan Maia has been sent from England to start a new life with distant relatives in Manaus, hundreds of miles up the Amazon. She is accompanied by an eccentric, mysterious governess who has secrets of her own for making the journey. Both discover an exotic world bursting with new experiences.</p>
<p>45.</p> 	<p>Six Dinner Sid by Inga Moore</p> <p>Sid is a cat who is addicted to having six meals a day and glories in this lifestyle. Manipulative, persuasive and a charmer, Sid has everybody wrapped around his little paw – each owner believes that he belongs to them only... until the day he is found out!</p>
<p>46.</p> 	<p>Michael Rosen’s Sad Book by Michael Rosen</p> <p>The author’s son, Eddie, died from meningitis, at the age of 19. Showing both sincerity and simplicity, this book acknowledges that sadness is not always avoidable or reasonable and that feelings of grief can be complicated and not always understood.</p>

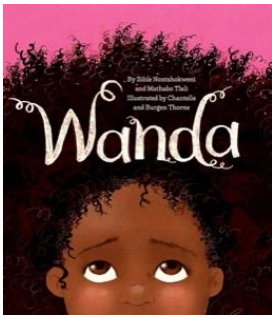
<p>47.</p> 	<p>Can You See Me? by Libby Scott</p> <p>Using genuine diary entries from an 11-year-old girl with autism, this story helps the reader to understand their viewpoint. Tally appears just like her friends – when she tries hard to be. However, being autistic means that there are things that bother and frustrate her, even when she doesn't want them to. People think that because Tally is Autistic, she doesn't realise what they're thinking, but she sees, hears – and notices – all of it.</p>
<p>48.</p> 	<p>A Dark, Dark Tale by Ruth Brown</p> <p>Follow the black cat's progress through the dark wood, into the dark house... and eventually to the surprise discovery at the back of the toy cupboard! This classic tale delights readers and introduces them to the pulse and pattern of good storytelling.</p>
<p>49.</p> 	<p>Glitter Boy by Ian Eagleton</p> <p>James loves dancing, poetry and Mariah Carey. His teacher is marrying his boyfriend, and James is singing in the choir at the wedding – but his dad is uncomfortable about the plan... and other things James talks about, like his new friend, Joel. Paul has been bullying James, calling him gay... and his spark is fast disappearing. This is a book about standing up for who you are and what you believe in, friendships and the importance of surrounding yourself with people who love you for who you are.</p>
<p>50.</p> 	<p>Percy Jackson and the Lightning Thief by Rick Riordan</p> <p>I was just a normal kid: school, basketball, skateboarding – the usual, until I accidentally vaporized my Maths teacher! Now I spend my time battling monsters and trying to stay alive. Zeus, God of the Sky, thought I'd stolen his lightning bolt – and let me tell you, making Zeus angry is not a smart idea!</p>
<p>51.</p> 	<p>Skellig by David Almond</p> <p>A house move, a very ill baby sister... Michael's world seems lonely and uncertain. In the garage of his new home, he finds a strange creature - part owl, part angel needing Michael's help if he is to survive. With friend Mina, Michael nourishes Skellig back to health. But Skellig is far more than he first appears, and as he breathes life into his sister, Michael's world changes for ever . . .</p>
<p>52.</p> 	<p>The Explorer by Katherine Rundell</p> <p>4 children fly in a plane over The Amazon. They crash into the canopy. Will they survive when the jungle is so vast and untamed and there is very little hope of rescue? A chance discovery that someone has been there before them might lead the way out...</p>

<p>53.</p> 	<p>Peace At Last by Jill Murphy</p> <p>It's late at night and Mr Bear is desperately trying to sleep. Mrs Bear snores so he tries Baby Bear's room, but Baby Bear is pretending to be an aeroplane so there's no peace there. Room by room, Mr Bear goes through the house trying to find somewhere to sleep!</p>
<p>54.</p> 	<p>Charlie and the Chocolate Factory by Roald Dahl</p> <p>Mr Willy Wonka, the most wondrous inventor in the world, opens the gates of his amazing chocolate factory to five lucky children. Gobstoppers, wriggle sweets and a river of melted chocolate delight await - Charlie Bucket needs to find just one Golden Ticket and these delicious treats could all be his!</p>
<p>55.</p> 	<p>Quiet Storm by Kimberley Whittam</p> <p>Storm has never liked to stand out from the crowd, but since she started Y7, her life has been full of people telling her she needs to speak up, make friends and be more like her popular big brother. When Storm breaks a school record, she finds herself the new star of the athletics team. But as she's thrust into the spotlight, her home life and friendships start spiralling out of control, and it's time for Quiet Storm to show that she has something to say. A tender, empowering novel about family, friendship and finding confidence in who you are.</p>
<p>56.</p> 	<p>The Day The Crayons Quit by Drew Daywait</p> <p>Duncan just wants to colour in but when he opens his box of crayons, he finds letters, all saying: 'We quit!' Each colour has a complaint to make about how much or how little they are being used! The battle lines have been drawn. What is Duncan to do?!</p>
<p>57.</p> 	<p>The Railway Children by E. Nesbit</p> <p>When Father is taken away by strangers, the lives of Roberta, Peter and Phyllis are shattered; they must move from their wealthy London life to a simple country cottage where Mother writes books to make ends meet. However, they come to love the railway that runs beside their cottage, befriend the porter Mr Perks and become heroes when they prevent a train disaster!</p>
<p>58.</p> 	<p>Cloud Busting by Malorie Blackman</p> <p>Sam doesn't want to be friends with Davey - he thinks Davey is a first class, grade A, top-of-the-dung-heap moron. But when Davey saves his life, a bond is formed between them. Told in first person and written in verse, this is the touching story of friendship that changes two boys' lives forever.</p>

<p>59.</p> 	<p>When The Sky Falls by Phil Earle</p> <p>It is 1941. War is raging and Joseph must live in the city where bombers rule the skies. There, he will live with Mrs F, a gruff woman with no fondness for children. Her only loves are the rundown zoo she owns and its mighty silverback gorilla, Adonis. As the weeks pass, Joseph and Adonis become friends, but what will happen when the bombers set him rampaging free?</p>
<p>60.</p> 	<p>The Sheep Pig by Dick King-Smith</p> <p>When Babe, the little orphaned piglet, is won at a fair by Farmer Hogget, he is adopted by Fly, the kind-hearted sheepdog. Babe is determined to learn everything he can from Fly. He knows he can't be a sheepdog... but maybe, just maybe, he might try!</p>
<p>61.</p> 	<p>Beegu by Alexis Deacon</p> <p>Beegu is not supposed to be on Earth. She is lost. She is a friendly little creature, but the 'Earth People' don't seem very welcoming at all. However, so far, she has only met the BIG ones... the little ones might be a different matter!</p>
<p>62.</p> 	<p>The Wind in the Willows by Kenneth Grahame</p> <p>This classic tale is a delight for every generation. Meet the wonderful characters of Ratty, Mole, Badger and the preposterous Mr Toad! As they go on their adventures, we find them messing about on the river, braving the Wild, Wild Woods, visiting Toad Hall and trying to keep Mr Toad in order as he gets up to mischief in his new motor car. Poop-poop!</p>
<p>63.</p> 	<p>Eragon by Christopher Paoloni</p> <p>When Eragon finds a polished stone in the forest, he thinks it is the lucky discovery of a poor farm boy; perhaps it will buy his meat for the winter. But when the stone brings a dragon hatchling, Eragon soon realises he has stumbled upon a legacy nearly as old as the Empire itself. Overnight, his simple life is shattered, and he is thrown into a perilous new world of destiny, magic and power.</p>
<p>64.</p> 	<p>The Street Beneath My Feet by Charlotte Guillain</p> <p>Have you ever wondered what is going on deep in the ground, under your feet? This fold-out information book takes you on a fascinating journey through the layers of the Earth, all the way to the planet's core and out the other side. There are so many geographical, archaeological and geological sights to see!</p>

<p>65.</p> 	<p>Hooray for Anna Hibiscus by Antinuke</p> <p>Nigerian storyteller, Antinuke created warm, charming stories about Anna Hibiscus and life with her wonderful extended family. Anna lives in 'Amazing Africa' (as she calls it), with her mother, father, baby twin brothers and lots of other family members. We join Anna as she splashes in the sea, prepares for a party, sells oranges and hopes to see 'sweet, sweet snow'!</p>
<p>66.</p> 	<p>Just So Stories by Rudyard Kipling</p> <p>These witty stories were originally told by Kipling to his children, providing them with fanciful accounts of how and why things came to be as they are. Generations of children have delighted to learn stories such as how the leopard got his spots and how the elephant acquired his trunk with the help of a crocodile!</p>
<p>67.</p> 	<p>Click Clack Moo: Cows That Type by Doreen Cronin</p> <p>Farmer Brown has a problem: his cows like to type. All day long he hears 'Click, clack, moo...Click, clack, moo!' But the problems really begin when the cows start leaving Farmer Brown notes. First it was electric blankets... where will it end? And when the animals don't get what they want, they go on strike!</p>
<p>68.</p> 	<p>Windrush Child by Benjamin Zephaniah</p> <p>Leonard is shocked when he arrives with his mother in the port of Southampton. His father is a stranger to him, it's cold and even the Jamaican food doesn't taste the same as it did back at home. But his parents have brought him here to try to make a better life, so Leonard does his best not to complain, to make new friends, to do well at school – even when people hurt him with their words and fists. This heart-stopping adventure shows us what it was like to be a child of the Windrush generation.</p>
<p>69.</p> 	<p>Cosmic by Frank Cottrell-Boyce</p> <p>Liam is too big for his boots - and his football strip - and blazer. But being super-tall has its advantages: he's the only 11-year-old to ride the G-force-defying Cosmic rollercoaster – or to be asked to drive a Porsche. Liam makes a giant leap for boy-kind by competing with a group of adults for a chance to go into space. Is he up for the job? Being big isn't all about being a grown-up!</p>
<p>70.</p> 	<p>The Brilliant World of Tom Gates by Liz Pichon</p> <p>Tom Gates is a master of excuses, expert doodler, comic story writer extraordinaire – and the bane of his teacher's life. And in his wacky journal of scribbles and silliness, you'll find all sorts of comic craziness to make you groan with glee! Do not attempt to read this in public; you will snigger loudly!</p>

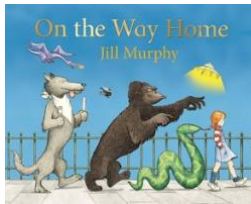


Wanda by Silhe Nontshokweni
